### **FOOD FOR THOUGHT**

In the course of producing our meetings, many of us find ourselves frequently on a plane to the meeting site(s). Those with overseas incentive trips are faced with long flights several times a year.

For that reason I thought you might find this recent article from Health Digest (of Consumers Digest) interesting!

"No More Jet Lag"

It won't make anybody skinnier but it may be a godsend for travelers who want to avoid the pole-axed feeling caused by jet lag.

Charles Ehret, and Argonne National Laboratory biologist outside Chicago, was instrumental in developing a new Jet Lag Diet. The diet is based on a three-day feast-and-fast cycle which, Ehret says, helps reset the body's internal clock to a new time zone by manipulating eating patterns, one of the body's basic cues. Findings show that jet lag can be appreciably reduced and often eliminated by following his diet plan.

The diet should begin three days before the proposed travel day with a day of feasting. The travelers should eat a large, high-protein breakfast and lunch, followed by a hearty dinner, high in carbohydrates. The second day should be a fast day of no more than 700 calories, consisting of such things as juices, salads, and light soups. The third day is another feast day. On the travel day, it's back to fasting. If possible, the last meal eaten on the plan should coincide with whatever meal would be served nearest that hour at the traveler's destination.

The switch from feast to fast leads the body to anticipate change, according to Ehret. The reduction of carbohydrates on the first fast day before travel depletes the liver reservoirs of carbohydrates and for reasons not clearly understood seems to help the body shift to a new set of time cues.

To help reset inner clocks, Ehret also recommends assuming the new time zone schedule of meals upon arrival, drinking coffee at appropriate times to shift the waking and sleeping cycles, and skipping alcoholic beverages in-flight.

#### MPI HELPFUL HINTS

#### **EMERGENCIES**

The role of the Meeting Planner is extremely important in any emergency situation which might take place at a meeting at a hotel. The Key Word for coping with such occurances is: PREPAREDNESS. The Planner should meet with the hotel in advance to find out how effective their security, medical and fire procedures are.

Put down in writing plans for every type of emergency imaginable and what action to take for each one. In foreign countries, this kind of homework can prove invaluable in the cases of hospitalization, loss of passport or even death.

#### **FIRE**

The planner should check out fire exits as well as making sure there are maps to these on the floors and in the rooms. Reminding the attendees before their arrival to bring a flashlight in their suitcase, is also a good idea. Having a fire check-list in the convention packets themselves, could be another idea to prevent panic should a fire occur.

In the meeting rooms, themselves, especially when the attendance is very large, the Planner should assign assistant Fire Marshalls who would be briefed on where the exit doors are and assigned to certain areas in case of a fire. This will be extremely important for an orderly evacuation.


#### **SECURITY**

Check out the security in the hotels. Find out the number and what their duties are; i.e.: Do they patrol the halls? Are they armed? In uniform? What precautions do they take after hours? Always encourage your attendees to make use of the safety deposit boxes for their valuables. Another hint is to remind them to keep their list of travelers checks separate from the checks themselves, in a safe place. When leaving a sleeping room, advise them to leave a light on and also the radio.

The above hints could perhaps aid the Planner in averting tragedy as well as personal loss for their attendees. These emergencies could turn a convention into a nightmare, if you are NOT PREPARED.

## EUROPEAN BUREAU ANNOUNCED BY MEETING PLANNERS INTERNATIONAL

Meeting Planners International (MPI) announces the appointment of Geoffrey V. Smith to direct its newly organized European Bureau, the first such service offered by the association on the European continent. Douglas A. Heath, Executive Vice President of MPI, said the appointment will be effective immediately.

As Director of MPI's new European Bureau, Mr. Smith will serve to extend information and professional contacts to MPI members holding meetings and conferences in Europe. He will be a source of information on transportation, site selection, terminology, monetary exchange and all matters of concern to meeting planners.

Mr. Smith is presently a member of ACE International (Association of Conference Executives) of London.

Mr. Smith's expertise and reputation have been built through years of deep involvement in the meeting industry. He was Director of the Convention Bureau of London from 1971 to 1982, according to several sources, he conducted the liveliest and most innovative decade in that organization's history. Under his leadership the London Bureau emerged as one of the best known in the world. He is a member of ICCA (International Congress and Convention Association) which is headquartered in The Netherlands.

Smith is Past-President of the European Federation of Conference Towns (EFCT), a group of cities in Europe banding together for meeting site promotion. He currently is a Marketing Director of EFCT.

Mr. Smith was the first non-North American Board member of the United

States based IAC&VB (International Association of Convention and Visitors Bureaus, Champaign, Illinois). For over 10 years, he has been a writer and columnist for MEETINGS AND CONVENTIONS magazine published in New York.


