### Programs VP Explains New Registration Guidelines Regarding 'Walk-ins'

The good news: MPI D/FW is setting new attendance records at "almost every" monthly chapter meeting.

The bad news: Increased attendance means more walk-in registrants, and "we're running out of room!"

That's the word from VP/Programs Betty Garrett, CMP (Garrett Speakers International).

"The Program Committee is pleased

with this terrific response to monthly programs," said Garrett, "but it emphasizes the need for on-time registration."

Fax registration must be completed by

Tuesday noon before the Thursday meeting.

Highlights of the updated registration guidelines (effective April 1) are:

- •Walk-in registration will be on a "first come, first served" basis. •Pre-registered and pre-paid participants will be seated first. Walk-ins will be seated, as space is available, 15 minutes after the start of the meeting.
- •Registration fees will be collected at registration and will not be refunded if space is not available. However, the late registrant is encouraged to participate in the reception. •Walk-in fees are: \$40, lunch, \$45, dinner.

### President's Message

### **Frequent Traveler Offers Packing and Safety Tips**

Colleen Rickenbacher, CMP, who travels frequently in her job as vice president/event planning for the Dallas Convention & Visitors Bureau, offers favorite tips on packing and safety.

Wool, cotton or polyester blends do not wrinkle as much as pure wool or 100% cotton. Knits are wonderful but don't even think of taking linen. There are numerous ways to pack to prevent wrinkles and the best I can suggest is to pack clothes in plastic bags from the dry cleaners. It allows your clothes to move and you arrive with few

The other method is the bundle. Basically you start with your larger items (jackets,

shirts, etc.) and lay them opened in the suitcase. Once all the clothes are open and stacked in the suitcase, use a core item to wrap them all around creating a bundle. None of the clothes are folded but just wrapped around this core item. The core item can be a bag containing your toiletries, a plastic bag containing your hair brush, curling iron, etc.

Both work but always remember that the hotel has irons and ironing boards, and you can always shop if you forgot something or it is entirely too wrinkled to wear.

Clothes such as t-shirts and other casual wear can be rolled to avoid wrinkling.

Remember to pack a sewing kit, flashlight (to keep by your D/FW Chapter President bed), eye glasses, prescription drugs, contact lens solutions, pocket knife and toiletries. Some of these items should always be

packed and ready to go. Keep a check list. There is nothing worse than to forget an item you thought you had packed. If traveling internationally, be sure to have all necessary adapters and documents.

#### Safety

Be smart. Be alert. Be aware of your environment. If you park your car at the airport, park near lights or in an open area close to the entrance. Lock all items you are not taking with you in the trunk. Do not leave your parking ticket visible. Most stolen cars used the owners' parking ticket to get out of the airport. Don't make it easy for a burglar. If taking a taxi, watch your luggage going into the trunk and especially watch when it is time to come out. Don't be in such a hurry that something is left behind.

Take time to watch your luggage come in with you when checking into a hotel. When traveling alone, women should sign in with last name and first initial only.

Ask for a room on the 2<sup>nd</sup> to 6<sup>th</sup> floor. This will keep you away from intruders but not too high in case of fire for ladders. When registering, never say your room number aloud. When the bellman asks for your room number, just show him the key or folder. If he repeats the number aloud, get another room. If you lose your room key, change rooms; don't just get another key. Have your room key in hand before you get to your room so you can always enter quickly.

When in your room be aware of your surroundings. How far are you from the floor exit? If the fire alarm does go off, follow instructions. If asked to leave, take your key, flashlight and glasses (that you have placed on the nightstand) and know exactly the route necessary. If trapped, stay low. If you cannot leave your room due to smoke, fill the bathtub with water, soak towels and put at the door. Help firefighters locate you by opening or removing the drapes from your window and write HELP on the glass by using shaving cream, soap, lipstick or whatever is available. Remember to breathe through a moistened washcloth.

Never put the "Maid Please" sign on your door if traveling alone. Instead, call housekeeping. For safety when in your room or while you are gone, hang the "Do Not Disturb" sign and leave the TV on.

Probably the best advice: When you travel, are out in the evening for meetings or even grocery shopping, driving by yourself, walking by yourself or even in your own home—be aware of your surroundings constantly and always be alert.

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



### MPI D/FW and Richland College—Partners in Education

This is the first of a three-part series on the Richland College Travel, Exposition & Meeting Management program.

Looking for a place to enhance your skills? Start with Richland College. Richland College and Meeting Professionals International/Dallas/Fort Worth Chapter have a long history of meeting the needs of D/FW meeting and travel professionals.

In the December 1998 issue of *The Meeting Professional*, Edward D. Barlow Jr., president of Creating the Future, noted that within the next five to 10 years, 20% of one's hours related to the job will be "dedicated to learning, to enhance one's abilities."

In the mid 80s, long before Richland College established an Associate of Applied Science Degree in Travel, Exposition & Meeting Management, MPI members worked with Richland College to offer Continuing Education Classes.

"It all started with one meeting planning class," says Lisa South, CMP, Computer Language Research Institute. In the beginning one class on meeting planning was offered though the Educational Committee. This one class, taught by MPI members, became so popular that it grew and an advanced meeting planning and an international meeting planning class was added.

All the courses were taught at Richland College and the students enrolled at Richland College as continuing education students. Thus, students were able to receive CEUs for classes.

"MPI had the instructors and we had the facility," says Carolyn MacPhee, Associate Dean of Continuing Education, Richland College. "The travel program has always been one of our most successful programs."

With the success of the continuing education program, Richland sought to establish an Associate of Applied Science Degree in Travel, Exposition & Meeting Management. In 1994 Norb Dettmann, CMP, who at that time worked for Tarrant County Junior College, approached Bill Boyd, president of Sunbelt Motivation & Travel Inc., to form an advisory committee to create Richland's travel and tourism degree.

"Our goal was to take the program to the next level," says Boyd. To complete this task, more than 100 travel industry professionals and leaders from MPI, International Association for Exposition Managers and American Society of Travel Agents participated in the development of Richland's degree.

Brent Kesterson, Instructional Design, Richland College explained, "A new degree does not just appear; analysis to identify need must be done, interviews must be conducted with industry professionals and course content must be developed."

Based on industry research for Dallas/Fort Worth, a one-year Travel Management Certificate and a two-year Associate of Applied Science Degree were created. The Associate of Applied Science Degree included three areas of industry emphasis: travel, exposition, & meeting management.

Richland began officially offering credited courses in travel, exposition & meeting management in the fall of 1994. The same instructors who taught continuing education classes were now teaching credited classes.

Next month this series will focus on how the MPI scholarship helps Richland College students and MPI reach educational goals.

### March Meeting Highlights

### Fort Worth Program: the 'Race to the Olympics—2012' plus Lesson in 'Meeting Planning Challenges'

The March meeting in Fort Worth, "MPI's Race to the Olympics," was everything the program committee hoped it would be—and then some!

However, there were two races the March program committee didn't plan on—change of venue at the last minute and the reception décor.

The First Race: Two days before the March newsletter printing deadline, the committee was advised that the hotel space they'd planned to use was needed for another group (a large corporation that is also an MPI member) and that there was no other space available in the hotel.

The program committee and hotel representatives worked with the large corporation to move the chapter meeting to another venue – The Fort Worth Convention Center. The corporation was also holding space there, but agreed to release a portion of it for the monthly MPI meeting. Logistics, food & beverage, décor, everything, was revised and set on a new course within two days.

The Fort Worth Convention Center staff and representatives from Fine Host Corporation worked with committee members to plan an outstanding evening for D/FW Chapter members. Three chefs (one flown in from Albuquerque, NM) from Fine Host prepared a five-course menu fit for royalty. Décor was added to the meeting room (compliments of Freeman Decorating and Balloons To You) to give it an "olympic" flavor.

The stage was set, everything was ready ... set ... but wait!

The Second Race: While setting up the reception area, committee members were anxiously awaiting the arrival of the NASCAR, PACE CAR and a LEGEND CAR from Texas Motor Speedway, provided by the Texas Motor Speedway Club, official sponsor of the evening reception in General Worth Park.

Just two hours before the reception, committee members learned that all three cars had been involved in an accident on the way from the Speedway and, along with additional raceway décor, would not be available for the reception.

Committee members brainstormed and


