# Celebrate the Multicultural Season

Christmas is not the only holiday celebrated during the winter months. The MPI D/FW Chapter Multicultural Initiative Steering Committee invites you to Celebrate the Season with an awareness of other winter holidays.



Chanukah, the Jewish Festival of Lights, commemorates both the defeat of the Syrians, whose king, Antiochus, had forbidden the Jews of Judea to worship God, and the miracle of the oil. When the great temple was rededicated there was only enough oil to light the N'er Tamid (the eternal flame) for one day. Once lit in a Jewish house of worship, this light should never be extinguished. By a miracle, it lasted for eight days. Chanukah, which means "rededication", is celebrated for eight days. Each night, prayers are said, candles are lit, special foods are served, games

are played and gifts are given. Chanukah's dates are based on the Jewish lunar calendar. This year, it will be celebrated from sundown on Dec. 19th to Dec. 26th.

Kwanzaa, a seven-day holiday, is a family and community strengthening observance for African-Americans, based on traditional African harvest festivals. Founded by Dr. Maulana Karenga in 1966, it is considered a spiritual rather than a religious holiday. It is celebrated Dec. 26th to Jan. 1st and is based on seven principles: Umoja (unity), Kujichagulia (self-determination), Ujima (collective work responsibility), Ujamaa (cooperative economics), Nia (purpose), Kuumba (creativity) and Imani (faith). Each night celebrates one of these principles. Special candles are lit. The holiday culminates in a Karumu, a celebration including ceremonies and feasting.

Chinese New Year is actually a 15-day festival. Based on the Chinese calendar, New Year's Day is the 2nd New Moon after the winter solstice. The holiday runs from new moon to full moon. New Year's Day 2004 will be Ian, 22nd, the

first day of the Year of the Monkey. Traditionally, this time was highlighted with a religious ceremony given in honor of Heaven and Earth, the gods of the household and the family ancestors. Each day of the festival is given to a particular purpose (for example, third and fourth days are for sons-in-law to pay respects to their parents-inlaw.) The fifteenth night is the Lantern Festival, which is celebrated with lantern displays and parades.

The multicultural committee hopes this has "whet your appetite" to find out more about these holidays. If you know somebody who celebrates one of them, ask!

## Random Thoughts on Member Care and Retention

Editor's Note: Normally, the "Message from the President" appears here, but this month, "The Current" shifts gears and celebrates the chapter's 25th Anniversary by asking long-time MPI D/FW member O.D. O'Donnell to provide comment on membership. O'Donnell has served in a variety of chapter leadership positions, currently serves on the MPI International Awards Committee and is an eight-time winner of the D/FW Chapter's membership recruitment award.

In today's environment of hard economic times and less disposable time, money and attention, membership growth is not a sure thing. Today's association must continue to understand and meet its members' needs if it wishes to truly represent those for whom it is organized.

What is clear is that today's members' expectations for services are higher and they want more for their dues dollar. MPI must take exceptional care of its members, stay in touch with their needs and continue to communicate the value of membership.

In planning association activities and making decisions regarding MPI's future, the International Awards committee is recommending that chapter's ask, "How many existing members will be retained and how many new members will be recruited as a result of this action?"

The single most important criterion for the retention of members in any organization is to meet the needs of the members. Retention begins the minute someone joins MPI.

It all begins with Membership and the sub-committees therein. Remember the four R's...Recruit, Recognize, Reward and Retain. We've all heard about the importance of a first impression. For that reason, I believe one of the most important committees within MPI is the Chapter Orientation Committee. In our own chapter, we take this opportunity to make our members and guests feel welcome. It also affords us the opportunity to give them an idea of what MPI is all about. We make them feel good about joining and at the same time motivate them toward getting involved in committee work. The opportunity to network during the meeting, enhanced by the Chapter's "Ambassadors" lends additional credence to the importance of getting involved.

The Involvement Committee is another critical committee with regard to Member Care. Committee members follow up on all new members and discuss involvement opportunities, including:

- Discuss different committees that they might be interested in
- Provide information on upcoming chapter events and meetings
- Confirm receipt of mailings/ newsletters and chapter e-mails
- Answer questions/solve any problems
- Encourage meeting attendance

Successful committee work is the key to keeping members active. Recognizing that committee work is the purpose of the chapter's annual Awards Gala held each June. The committee that plans that event makes sure we properly recognize and reward our deserving members at this event.

# Our COTY Win #1: 1988-1989

Winning the Chapter of the Year Award-a first-time win for our chapter-capped off my year as D/FW chapter president. I will never forget attending the international conference, sitting at the gala banquet with other D/FW chapter members, Mary Jo Malone on my left (D/FW chapter president-elect) and Greg Elam (a D/FW chapter past president) next to her. When the winning chapter announcement was made, I was so stunned I could not move! Mary Jo nudged me and practically bumped me out of my chair. Greg said, "Well, don't just sit there, go on up and accept the award!" Mary Jo, still holding her dinner napkin, and I went up on the stage to accept the award. No other detail about the acceptance of the award do I remember; the experience remains a blur to this day. I do recall that immediately after the dinner and ceremony we phoned at least twenty other D/FW chapter members, not the least of whom was Judy Love Bradley Rondeau, the chairperson of the submission committee (which meant she put the entire chapter application notebook together). That's how my term as president ended, but how it began was an important prelude to this event.

Our chapter board realized that in order for us to win the Chapter of the Year Award, we needed to get more than just the officers and board members involved during "our" year. We needed "infrastructure" and "volunteerism" in order to shine. So my year was punctuated with soliciting service from our members, with establishing committees and then getting volunteers to "step up to the plate" to fill the positions within those committees, and with organizational management in order to get the largest percentage of our chapter members involved in the chapter. The best board any chapter president could ever haveone that included future D/FW chapter presidents Mary Cowart, Phyllis Firebaugh, Judy Love Bradley Rondeau, Mary Jo Malone and Diane Smith, assisted me. The board successfully motivated 78% of our membership into action in 1988-89. And, I think, we all had a great deal of fun in the process.

As I think back to 1988 and try to remember our challenges, opportunities and successes, what immediately comes to mind are the differences between then and now:

- Registrations were handled by clipping a mail-in form from our newsletter or at the registration table on check-in. We had no web site to "click on."
- Chapter events were so much smaller. Our average attendance at a meeting was 100.
- The logistics for our meetings were much easier to


handle. We were not nearly as sophisticated as the events and meetings of our chapter today. The AV, if any, consisted of a screen and overhead projector. (PowerPoint had just been introduced in 1987!)

- The finances of the chapter were much simpler. Our little bank account hardly kept our treasurer busy, and the balance sheet was only a half page in length.
- The newsletter was on 17"x 11" paper, folded in the middle, and we had problems filling it with chapter news.
- Board meetings were casual events usually held at a member's home.
- Only twenty-five chapter members attended the Annual Conference when we won the Chapter of the Year Award and we thought that was a huge attendance. The number pales in comparison to how many of our chapter members attend international conferences today.

Throughout the term from June 1988 to June 1989, we enjoyed many successes leading up to the Chapter of the Year Award:

- That small group established the first Meeting Planning Course at Richland College, the precursor to the current Travel, Exposition and Meeting Management Associate degree program.
- Our chapter board set up the first joint volunteer program with Love for Kids in an effort to further our community involvement.
- Branching out from our regular monthly meeting (a scary prospect), we established, for the first time, four breakfast workshops. They worked and we continued them.
- Attendance at our monthly meetings increased as the year progressed because almost everyone was involved.

The D/FW chapter has come a long way since I was honored to serve the members as president, but it is gratifying to know that it has continued its winning tradition and is continuing to offer new and improved networking and educational opportunities for its membership.





Have you been wondering about the CMP certification program and growing professionally? This is a great opportunity to discover the ins and outs of the CMP certification process and begin the first step in the process - filling out the CMP Application.

In order to qualify as a candidate for CMP Examination, an individual must have:

- A minimum of three years experience in meeting management
- Current, full-time employment\* in a meeting management capacity (CIC will accept applications from applicants who have been unemployed for a period less than twelve (12) months from the date his or her application is submitted)
- Responsibility and accountability for the successful completion of meetings

The certification program requires a two-step process in which applicants (1) demonstrate via a point system their broad range of experience in the field of meeting management on the CMP Application, and (2) successfully complete a written examination covering the functions performed in meeting management.

One of the most important functions of the MPI D/FW Chapter begins this month with the forming of the Nominating Committee to seek qualified members for leadership positions as officers and directors for the 2004-2005 chapter year.

This chapter needs YOU. Our chapter is built on conscientious, hard-working passionate volunteers. People like YOU are the reasons that D/FW is a great chapter and serves as a benchmark for other chapters. Everyone brings valuable, special gifts to this chapter through his/her volunteerism. If you have led in another organization, your community, your workplace or have always wanted to have a leadership role, this is the opportunity to try your skills in a supportive organization.

How does the process work?

**Step 1:** The Nominating Committee is formed with the Immediate Past President, Betty E. Garrett, CMP, serving as chair. The composition of the Nominating Committee is reflected in the Chapter's Policies. The Nominating Committee will be comprised of an equal number of planners and suppliers.

# LCoS Technology

Liquid Crystal on Silicon (LCoS) technology is similar to LCD in that it uses a liquid-crystal imaging device. But like DLP, LCoS reflects rather than transmits light. The light from the lamp is split into separate colored light streams by a polarized beam splitter, just like LCD, and is then reflected by an LCD imager that changes reflectivity in accordance with the signal level. The light streams are then recombined and projected.

There are two primary benefits of LCoS technology. LCoS has the highest fill factor of the three main digital projection technologies. It also has the highest resolutions. This combination of high fill factors and high-resolution combines to give LCoS images a very smooth, integrated appearance.

There are three main disadvantages of LCoS technology. While LCoS has good contrast, it's not as good as a single-chip DLP because there are three light paths and three imagers. LCoS solutions are more expensive than comparable LCD and DLP projectors. LCoS projectors aren't available in packages less than 10 lbs., which has kept them out of the portable markets.
