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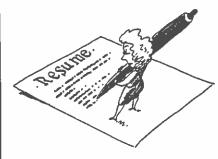

The SMART CARD: What a Smart Idea!

The MPI Dallas/Fort Worth Chapter has the best idea yet to get smart. It's a SMART CARD—a ticket to more learning opportunities than members have time to take advantage of. Here's the deal:

For a one-time fee of \$75 members are issued a SMART CARD. That's when the fun starts. For six months (January through June or July through December), the SMART CARD gets the member into any of the multitude of educational events offered by the chapter (with exception of the monthly chapter meetings).

The full value of the Smart Card can exceed \$750, if a member could manage to find the time to take advantage of all these educational offerings.

When Vice President of Education Peg Wolschon organized brainstorming sessions with the Education Committee, the group was challenged to improve attendance at the education sessions.

Director of Education Tamara Quilty (MCI Planners), said "It's easier for me to request a \$75 company check once than to request ten \$10 checks." Taking this concept the next step forward, and combining it with affordable, high-quality, educational programs, the SMART CARD was born.

To make the SMART CARD even more accessible, the chapter has educational funding available for scholarship distribution through the Jan Pollard Award for Professional Growth.

Members may apply for funding for various educational opportunities offered through MPI or the local chapter, including the SMART CARD.

Says Delinda Dudley, with Fun Factory, "I can attend great educational offerings and still save my company a lot of money." There are so many exciting educational events to attend!

The Walk-a-While-in-My-Shoes program, for example, puts members right in the middle of an array of professions—Airplane Functions, Event Planning,

Hotel Operations, a constantly changing venue. Members spend two hours in the evening learning very "hands on" how planners or suppliers do their jobs, what challenges they face, and what information they need to accomplish their projects.

"Having the SMART CARD encouraged me to attend more programs such as the Walk-a-While. I had so many more networking opportunities with other MPI members," said Leah Belasco, Consultant.

The CMP Study Group and the CMP University, usually an \$85 cost, is included in the SMART CARD offering. It's an incentive for serious meeting professionals to initiate their qualification for CMP certification."

The use of the SMART CARD definitely increases attendance for the CMP Study Group and University and makes them affordable to individuals whose companies don't ordinarily pay for professional development," says Brenda Miller, CMP.

The PO⁴D meetings—another Dallas/Fort Worth Chapter initiative—are a way to meet and network with the suppliers and planners in specific geographical regions; they too are included with the SMART CARD.

Sherri Cook, CMP, has arranged for a series of Computer Software Classes with Richland College, a huge savings for SMART CARD holders! Opportunities to learn Excel, Access, Word, and Internet Basics geared toward Meeting Professionals.

The real value of the SMART CARD is in its promotion of the industry via networking and education.

Each participating member gets one step closer to personal and professional development, their CMP goal, furthering the industry and strengthening the professional community.

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Business Etiquette and Technology

As you use e-mail, pagers, cellular phones and faxes, are you using professional business etiquette?

Do not let technology override common courtesy. Don't allow the bottom line and your own convenience to become more important than professionalism.

E-mail is quicker, more efficient and more cost-effective than other means of communication—a valuable asset to meeting professionals who value the effective use of time and money.

An E-mail should be written like a memo; it should be direct and brief. But it should also be grammatically correct—with correct spelling and no abbreviations.

Respond to e-mail in a timely manner. Automated responses are available; to ignore an e-mail message is rude.

"Call waiting" can be a blessing—but to say, "hold on" and go to another call is rude. It sends the message: "Your call is not important."

When sending faxes, be aware of the recipient's office environment. When the fax machine is in a large, open area for the use of multiple employees, proper cover pages are important.

Cute, clever graphics may be appropriate for informal communications, but appear unprofessional in the business world.

Unsolicited faxes are fast becoming the "junk mail" of the industry. It is presumptuous to send an unsolicited fax, tying up the phone line and using unnecessary paper or drive space for what the recipient considers "junk."

While cellular phones and pagers allow accessibility, don't let these busi-

ness aids undo protocol. To constantly take phone calls or return a page, have a pager go off while in a business meeting or luncheon is disrespectful. When meeting with a client, business or associate, turn them off or to "pulse."

Conducting a phone conversation in a public area is also disruptive; go somewhere quiet and away from others.

During meetings always turn off your phone when a speaker is talking. This holds true for monthly MPI chapter meetings.

Keep voice mail messages updated, timely and informative. Be businesslike, not cute. Anticipate callers' questions.

Finally, customer service, complaints, problems should always be solved personally or over the phone directly. Voice and e-mail messages should never be used to handle awkward or confidential matters.

Always treat your business associates to the same good manners used with family and friends!

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We are part of your team. Remember, teamwork wins!

MPI Foundation Study Completed Making Meetings Work: An Analysis of Corporate Meetings

A recent nationwide study by the MPI Foundation examined key success drivers to sales meetings, management meetings and education/training meetings in the corporate environment.

After the study, the MPI Foundation published "Making Meetings Work: An Analysis of Corporate Meetings."

Written by noted educator and author, Lewis Phillips, Ed.D., the paper is the first of two to digest key findings from the study—nicknamed a gap analysis.

The study examined the attitudes of senior managers and meeting attendees in U.S. corporations to determine if planners are fulfilling the expectations of these key stakeholders.

While an overwhelming number of senior managers (85%) think their meetings are successful and are pleased with facilities and arrangements, they have concerns about what happens with the attendees after the meeting.

The chief desire of senior managers is that the meeting impart •a clear sense of organizational priorities; •concrete action plans; •improved interaction; •important messages that are remembered; •greater productivity from learning; •improved motivation and inspiration; and •greater commitment to the organization.

The paper reports that meeting professionals are generally not concerned with how attendees perform after the meeting. Like attendees, they are more focused on what occurs in the meeting room.

Key meeting success factors for attendees are: •the speakers are well prepared; •the agenda was covered; •the equipment worked; •the meeting stayed on schedule; •sufficient take-away materials were available; •the appropriate people were there; and •speakers held their attention.

Meeting professionals agree with attendees on what makes meetings successful. They differ in their perceptions, however, of whether meetings leave attendees inspired and motivated. Meeting professionals overwhelmingly think meetings accomplish this while attendees disagree. Other findings:

•Meetings should be planned around clearing identified problems or issues with specific desired outcomes. These outcomes should dictate the form and process of the meeting.

 Meetings should be viewed as learning experiences designed to change behavior.

•The mere dissemination of content does not change one's performance. How attendees integrate and use what they experience depends largely on what occurs during the meeting. The delivery method is just as important as content if learning and change are to occur.

wide representing the global events marketplace. ExpoWorld.net is a resource of over 500 links to the most useful search tools for locating conferences, conventions, trade shows, special events, industry suppliers, associations and publications in any country worldwide.

MPI was the first association in the industry to use streaming audio and video on its Website and showcase a meeting through the Internet.

The concept, Meeting WOWTM (Meeting WithOut Walls) is also a model for the MPI membership. Meeting WOW allows MPI planner members to put their meetings on the Internet using a proven design process created by meeting professionals.

The Meeting WOW feature has been used for over a year-and-a-half and features speakers, personal schedulers, message centers, online registration, and audio/video streaming of general sessions.

This concept provides MPI members convenient information on demand at their fingertips.

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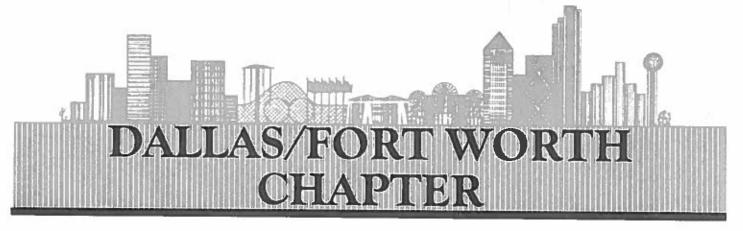
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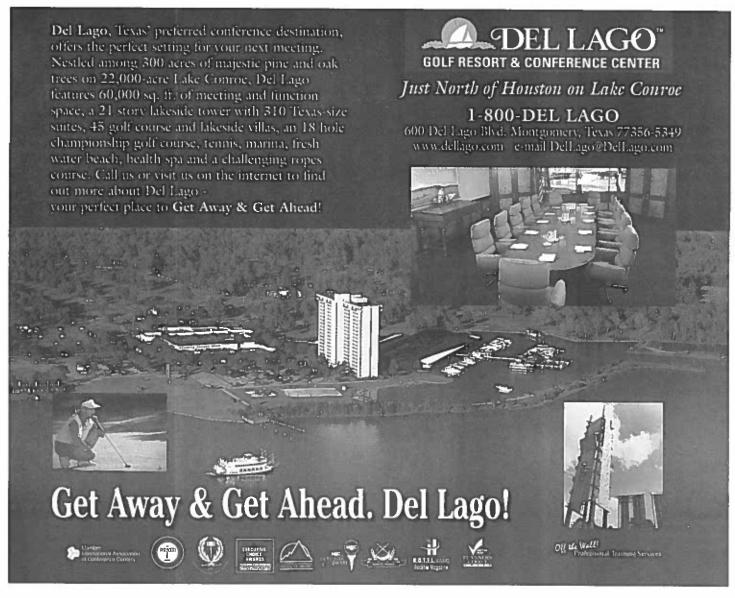
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
